EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

Imagine a sanctuary where the families of our veterans—those who have sacrificed so much for our nation—find the support they need, when they need it most. Legacy House will be more than just a building; it will be a lifeline, a space for healing, rebuilding, and hope. Designed to meet the unique needs of deceased or incapacitated veterans' families, it will provide emergency accommodation, tailored programs, and essential services under one roof. This bold initiative will foster collaboration among service providers, strengthening connections and building a more resilient community.

The need for Legacy House has never been greater. The Royal Commission found, every week, **1.5 veterans are lost to suicide**, and families play a vital role in veterans' recovery and mental health. Yet, these families have been historically overlooked. The Royal Commission identified family-focused centres as a key recommendation, and Legacy House directly aligns with this vision. By addressing the gaps in care for families, we not only improve their wellbeing but reduce the strain on healthcare and social services.

Legacy House will also be an economic catalyst, creating jobs during construction and sustaining employment through its operations. Located on a council-owned parcel of land, with concept designs and cost estimates already completed, the project is ready to proceed. The total estimated cost is **\$5.1 million**, encompassing innovative design, sustainable features, and state-of-the-art facilities.

However, this vision cannot be realised without your support. FNQ Legacy has demonstrated resilience and dedication through challenges like the Global Financial Crisis, floods, and COVID-19, consistently delivering vital services veterans and their families in Far North Queensland. This year alone, we have supported more than 500 veterans' families, a testament to our unwavering commitment. Yet, while we have the financial resources to cover operational costs, we require funding for capital works to ensure the long-term sustainability of this transformative project.

PROJECT NEED

The 2021 Australian Bureau of Statistics (ABS) data highlights a stark reality: Queensland leads the nation in its concentration of veterans, and with over 11,000 residing in our region we service —excluding their families—North Queensland has the highest per capita veteran population in the country, and yet families of veterans, particularly those who are deceased or incapacitated, remain under-supported. While significant attention is often given to the veterans themselves, the families—who shoulder the emotional, financial, and social burden—are frequently overlooked.

The findings from the Royal Commission into Defence and Veteran Suicide further emphasize this need. The Commission revealed alarming gaps in support services for veterans' families, underscoring the direct impact that inadequate assistance has on mental health, financial stability, and overall wellbeing of the veteran and family member. Families of veterans are disproportionately affected by issues like housing instability, mental health challenges, and access to care, which are compounded when a veteran is incapacitated or passes away.

These families face unique struggles, including isolation, financial hardship, and the emotional toll of caring for incapacitated veterans or grieving the loss of a loved one. The Royal Commission's recommendations call for more veteran and family centres to be established.

Legacy House directly responds to these findings by providing a much-needed centralised location where families can access tailored programs, emergency accommodation, and crucial support services. This project aims to fill the gaps identified by both local research, surveys and the Royal Commission, ensuring that veterans' families are no longer left behind.

By offering a holistic approach, Legacy House will alleviate pressures on existing social services, and provide critical mental health and wellness programs. It will also serve as a model for collaboration among service providers, creating an integrated support network that addresses the Royal Commission's key recommendations for better family-focused care.

Legacy House is not just a solution; it is a necessity. The Royal Commission findings highlight a growing, urgent need for tailored services that truly address the challenges faced by veterans' families. Legacy House will answer that call, providing a sustainable and impactful solution that will change lives for generations to come.

COSTINGS AND BUDGET

The total estimated cost of Legacy House is \$5,118,000 (excluding GST), based on a detailed Concept Design Estimate by Rider Levett Bucknall. This includes construction-related costs, contingencies, and essential development items such as commercial kitchen equipment, residential amenities, and security services. The design also incorporates sustainability measures, like solar panels, to reduce ongoing costs. Annual funding will cover maintenance, utilities, staffing, and programs, supported by FNQ Legacy's strategic financial planning and fundraising efforts. This carefully planned budget ensures Legacy House will meet the immediate and future needs of veterans' families, providing a high-value, impactful community resource.

PROJECT DESCRIPTION

Central to the design is a strong focus on community. Legacy House includes multiple communal spaces where families can come together, share experiences, and participate in various activities. A large function space, quiet reflection areas, and an outdoor deck will provide flexible environments for both social gatherings and individual moments of contemplation. These spaces are complemented by dedicated areas for children, ensuring that young family members have a place to play, learn, and feel included in the community.

Legacy House also offers a range of tailored services for veterans' families, housed within purpose-built rooms designed to meet their unique needs. Wellness rooms, counseling offices, and emergency accommodation will provide essential support in a private and secure setting. These spaces have been designed to offer families the services they need in times of crisis while fostering an atmosphere of dignity and care.

To encourage collaboration among service providers and community organisations, the design includes a boardroom, offices, and meeting spaces. These areas are essential for fostering partnerships and facilitating the seamless delivery of integrated care and support programs. Legacy House will serve as both a physical and symbolic hub for community action and collaboration, uniting different stakeholders under one roof to better serve veterans' families.

In addition to its functional elements, Legacy House will feature modern amenities, such as a café and a kitchen, where visitors and staff can gather and enjoy meals in a warm, social atmosphere. These amenities contribute to the overall sense of community and provide a comfortable space for day-to-day interactions. The building's exterior and outdoor spaces are designed with sustainability in mind, using environmentally friendly materials and creating a natural connection to the surrounding environment.
